




PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION 2020



- 10/2 – Non-Opt Teacher Planning Day (Teachers report to school sites beginning this day.)
- Early childhood and students with special needs on a modified curriculum return first (on 10/5) to become familiar with the new environment/routines. Remaining elementary grades and secondary transition grades return next (on 10/7). All remaining grades return on 10/9.
- High school start times revert to 7:20 a.m. for both My School Online and Schoolhouse on 10/7.
- The progressive, staggered approach allows school sites to test social distancing protocols and adjust if necessary, leveraging a reduced capacity for two to four days before operating at the maximum schoolhouse capacity for Stage II.

for Block Schedule






SCHOOL MAP
